


## St James the Less - Friends' Newsletter - January 2024

## Drinks Evening on Monday 22<sup>nd</sup> Jan 2024, from 6.00pm at the Church

**Work so far:** the Thomas Earp pulpit was conserved and stabilised in 2015-17, while the chancel wall and railings were spectacularly restored last year (*right*). With support from the Diocese, we are now surveying and assessing the overall needs, including structural and decorative works.



**Eco-Church:** when the heating boilers were condemned last

summer, we explored ecological improvements. SJtL is already at bronze standard, as recognised by Eco-Church, a charity supporting churches to become as close as possible to carbon neutral, while also preserving their distinctive heritage. An energy audit in October showed that use of modern technology is limited in this complex and highly decorated historic building, but clever solutions can be found – eg. photo-voltaic cells on some roof slopes. While talks, visits, tours and other events regularly raise small donations, this emphasis on sustainability will also lead to vital grants and trust funding, to help meet the major costs involved.

**G. E. Street bicentenary June 2024:** working with the Victorian Society, the Friends are very excited to offer a programme of events over 2024, celebrating the 200<sup>th</sup> birthday of George Edmund Street, the remarkable architect of this extraordinary church. *Save the Dates* for: a <u>Gala Dinner</u> on his birthday – Thursday 20th June – and a <u>day's Symposium</u> on Friday 21st June.

Meanwhile, Neil Jackson reports on the Geoff Brandwood Memorial Lecture, held on 22<sup>nd</sup> November in the Church Centre, which gave a fascinating taste of how St James the Less demonstrates the brilliance of George Edmund Street's eye for design:

**The Geoff Brandwood Memorial Lecture:** Peter Howell presented the Ecclesiological Society's first Memorial Lecture dedicated to Geoff Brandwood, who had been a member of SJtL Friends Committee before his unexpected death two years ago. Geoff had been writing a book on the church's architect, George Edmund Street, and it was Peter Howell who, with the late Peter Taylor, took on the challenge of bringing Geoff's manuscript to publication. It's due to be on the shelves from February 2024 – watch this space!

Using Geoff's excellent photographs and a selection of nineteenth-century prints, Peter led his audience through a long list of Street's work from his very first building, St Mary's church at Par, Cornwall (built 1849), to his last and best known, the Royal Courts of Justice on the Strand, London, completed in 1882, a year after Street's death. Peter also showed stained glass, metalwork, church plate and needlework, all made to Street's designs. Street was the consummate designer, as can be seen at St James the Less, perhaps the first and greatest church of his maturity.

**Hama Bead Church:** This clever image of St James the Less, brilliantly designed by Ben and Amabel Ealovega, will be on display shortly, with an invitation to guess how many beads were used to make it!



Parishioners and neighbours joined in, both on foot and from their windows and balconies throughout the local estate and streets.



**Christmas Day Lunch:** the church family welcomed 50 individuals to celebrate Christmas Day together. A full Christmas lunch, prepared the day before by Lis and numerous willing helpers, was served in the Church Centre, creating a joyful gathering for everyone on this important day.
