



## St James the Less Street Project Friends' Newsletter – Summer 2025

### Funding

We are delighted to announce the news of a grant of £5,000 from the National Churches Trust and a private donation of £2,500. Together with the funds already saved in our Project pot, this enables us to move on with plans for a range of surveys which are the next important steps on our journey.

We'll start with a Measured Survey, which will enable us to break down the requirements for the project into component parts which we can then finance as separate elements. It will also facilitate an exciting set of computer aided design graphics (CAD) which will provide a splendid 3-D image of our vision for the church.

### Works

Preparation for the restoration of the Railings is progressing steadily, with the Faculty granted from the London Diocese, and final details (including a flood risk assessment) being submitted to Westminster Council to approve planning permission.

### Visits

We've been very pleased to host a couple of successful visits in the past few months, including Volunteers from Two Temple Place and a return visit by Members of The Victorian Society in America. Roy is also booked for a private tour of the church for an American couple in early August.

**Two Temple Place** is a quirky building near Temple Station, built in 1895. It's open to the public every spring when they host an exhibition, and on other days through the year, including September Open House. It was commissioned by American businessman William Waldorf Astor and designed by church architect, John Loughborough Pearson. Although there is no direct link with George Edmund Street (as far as we know), Pearson and Street will certainly have known each other, and they used some of the same suppliers, including Clayton and Bell for stained glass windows and Salviati + Co for glass mosaics. The Volunteers enjoyed talks from Roy Stallard on the context for St James the Less, Professor Neil Jackson on Street's works, and Reverend Lis on the iconography within the building.

In July we welcomed back the Summer School students of the **Victorian Society in America** for their first church visit in the 2025 programme taking them from London to Manchester, Oxford and Surrey in search of good Victorian and Edwardian architecture. Professor Neil Jackson led the group towards the church from the far end of Thorndyke Street, as it would originally have been approached. By passing the carved scenes from the Book of Genesis on the church's north wall and entering beneath the arch depicting the Wise and Foolish Virgins, the didactic intent of the building was soon apparent. Inside, the nave capitals and pulpit carvings, together with the figures of female saints incised around the apse and the others depicted in the stained-glass windows, showed what an important, educational building St James the Less had been for the local community when it was originally built. For these American visitors, it must have been quite an eye-opener.

These visits generate modest donations and we would like to encourage more. If you or your friends know of a group who would enjoy a visit to St James the Less, with talks and (limited) refreshments, please contact Samantha. Donations suggested @ £5 per head.
